NEXT WEEK'S SPEAKERS

Malcolm McCorquodale, President, Houston Genealogical Forum, discussed the variety of resources potentially available to research one's ancestry, beginning with the National Genealogical Society. Sources can include birth certificates, published obituaries, cemetery records, and wills. He warned that sometimes conflicting information is found, so further sleuthing may be needed. To learn more, on Saturday, May 6, between 10-noon, you may participate in a free webinar on genealogy. He also mentioned that our own Glenwood Cemetery (home of some notable residents) information can now be found online at glenwoodcemetery.org. Popular resources to begin filling in your genealogical past include familysearch.org or ancestry.com.



Praveena Lakshmanan and Lili Bauerlein, Community Engagement Program, Refugee Services (Interfaith Ministries) described how their program works for assisting legal refugees in our area. We were reminded that a refugee is "someone who is unable or unwilling to return to their country of origin, owing to a well-founded fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group, or political opinion". The number admitted has sharply declined over the past couple of decades. The process begins with their arrival here or elsewhere, then agencies assist, followed by a 6-month process of resettlement. Over 90% of our area refugees are self-sufficient within those 6 months, thanks to core programs that include vocational training, employment, medical and cash assistance, and social adjustment services.



The LEOH donations will certainly assist in achieving this goal!
